From the Session Clerk

Dear friends

"Some of the early Christians were scattered like seeds in the breeze. Where they took root, they shared the Good News and gathered a new Christian community".

This image, taken from a Mission & Discipleship report, is one I find very helpful in understanding how *Emerging Church* ideas differ from the way in which we have previously approached mission activity. *Emerging Church* shows that evangelism isn't only about drawing people into the existing church community (though we won't give up on that work!).

Many people in our parish are unable or unwilling to come to the kind of services and fellowship we currently offer. There can be all sorts of reasons - they may work on a Sunday, they may find it difficult to meet with God in our style of services, they may distrust "organised religion" or they may never have encountered the gospel message.

Emerging Church challenges Christians to step out from the place where they are rooted and allow themselves to be scattered into the wider community to plant new worshipping groups. If we could do that in the Barclay Viewforth parish we could *make known God's love in Jesus* to those who currently seem beyond the reach of the message.

These are the ideas the Kirk Session has been considering, with proposals covering

- a church plant, with a group who were part of the former Viewforth congregation feeling called to form the core of such an initiative
- other cell group ideas based around existing activities (perhaps the Film Club or Alpha course follow on groups) and/or new initiatives.

Some of these ideas might lead to people joining the main congregation, but others will take root on their own as new and emerging churches.

We need, I think, to prayerfully consider the image of the Holy Spirit, the breath of God, as the breeze blowing the seeds. Are there people within our fellowship who feel this step of faith is something to which God is calling them?

Over the next month or so a group will be presenting these ideas to the church in greater detail. And whether you feel guided towards this stepping out into the community, or encouraged to support the mission activities which are part of the existing congregation's life, please continue to pray that our outreach to the parish will be effective and bear much fruit.

Barclay Viewforth Congregational Board

As the Stated Annual meeting will be held on Wed 24th March I thought it a good time to write a bit about what The Congregational Board does.

The Board is made up of 15 Elders chosen by Session along with 15 members of the Congregation who are not Elders. The role of the Board is to be 'responsible for the financial and other temporal affairs of the Congregation'.

This is a practical role which includes managing the finances (working with the Treasurer to plan how best to use the finances we have, to do God's work), maintenance and development of the fabric of the Church properties (currently 2 Church and Halls buildings and 5 other properties), and the management of the Halls (although the day to day work is carried out by the Halls Manager we are involved in liaising with her and discussing issues of concern).

The Board meets every second month from September to May on a Monday evening as well as occasional other meetings as necessary. There are 3 subgroups, Finance, Fabric and Halls Management. Everyone is encouraged to contribute to one of these groups which feedback to the whole Board.

As well as these duties members of the Board along with Kirk Session members are responsible for welcoming people as they arrive for services and counting the offering after the service. The welcoming role is particularly important to ensure any newcomers are noticed and everyone is made to feel part of the Congregation. There is a rota for this and each team has a convener.

The duties of the board are varied and integral to the Congregational life, working together we can be good stewards of the resources we have been given to manage.

We need new Congregational members of the Board each year; please consider if this is a role that you could serve God in. Nomination forms will be available from 28th Feb or if you are interested in finding out more then please speak to Sam Torrens or Katharine Ellis.

Whether you are interested in joining the Board or not we hope as many people as possible will attend the Annual Meeting which will be followed by Wine and Cheese and a chance to chat.

❑ **Members of the Cast:** there is still time to get a non-

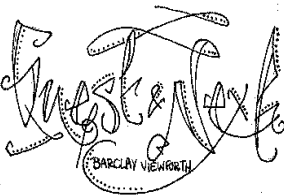

Meet the congregation

Our editor is ever keen to persuade members to write about themselves in these hallowed pages, and so the recent union has given her an opportunity to widen her net!

With schooldays hobbies of electronics and amateur radio, it wasn't too surprising that I studied electronic engineering and computing at Heriot-Watt University, *still in the Grassmarket in those days*. Since then I've worked for a number of companies developing computer systems for a variety of environments, including gas and oil production, training systems for air force pilots, steel making, energy management, computer networking, requirements management and artificial speech. A few years ago I changed direction slightly and now head the IT department at the Royal Botanic Garden Edinburgh, where we look after the varied computing and information services needs of several hundred people including scientific and horticultural staff, students and volunteers.

I'm married to Gladys, a primary teacher in Musselburgh, and we have two daughters. Jenny is a doctor working in the Lothians and Fife (and who runs a Guide company with Lindsey Anderson, another link with Barclay) and Heather is a law student in Aberdeen. They're also all into music in some shape or form.

I probably took after my mother (Moirra) in terms of getting involved with things at Viewforth Church. Having been connected with many organisations there since before I went to school, I became more involved at the time of the vacancy there in 1973, joined the Congregational Board a few years later, subsequently the Kirk Session, and have been associated with various committees and other groups. I was also one of the organisers of the Viewforth Centre, where for many years we ran the halls complex as a theatre venue during the Festival Fringe. *I also recall measuring up Barclay Church in the late 1970s to produce plans for one of our American companies to mount a show in the Barclay Sanctuary.*

Going back five or six years, I was one of the working party which brought Barclay and Viewforth Churches together as a Parish Grouping. From there I was one of the Viewforth observers on the Nominating Committee which selected Sam as minister, and more recently on the working group discussing the details of the Union. Having worked with so many Barclay folk over the past few years I've certainly found the transition easier, but tribute must be paid to all those who have worked to make the Union successful.

Outside church work one of my main interests over the years has been in theatre, and in particular stage lighting and sound. I have worked in theatres around the country, including Church Hill Theatre, Queen's Hall and the Usher Hall in Edinburgh. On leaving school (*where I was a member of the 'Sound Crew'*) my first 'real' work was as the sound engineer in an Edinburgh Festival production entitled 'Bible One' at Haymarket Ice Rink, converted into a giant theatre in the round. Performed by the Young Vic (part of the National Theatre from London) and directed by Frank Dunlop, the second part of this sell-out show comprised a little-known musical piece which then went on to become more familiar to theatre audiences – Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat. The rest, as they say, is history.

"What is a Person?"

30 January 2010, Church House, Linlithgow

The above day conference was organised under the auspices of the Mission and Discipleship Council of the Church of Scotland by the group "Why Believe?". This interdenominational apologetics group seeks to present credible Christianity in a society where increasingly aggressive voices of atheist and secularist are raised.

The welcome at Church House was warm, with a plentiful supply of hot coffee and home made scones. Not long before it was time to get down to business, however.

The first speaker, Professor Thomas Torrance, is a Senior Lecturer in Economics, with research interests in related moral and social philosophy. Covering moral philosophers from David Hume to more recent thinkers such as Alan Turing and Sir John Eccles, he sought to refute the theory of determinism; he defined a "person" as one in possession of free will, able to decide what is rational or moral and make genuine choices. His scholarly lecture provided much to think about.

Next came Dr Elaine Storkey, a respected theologian and sociologist. She illustrated her talk with amusing cartoons, providing us with a few chuckles amidst the serious discussion of the post modern idea of self ("no design, no designer"). She took the biblical view of what makes us human – someone in relationship (to mother, family, friends and with God). She saw no dichotomy between soul and body, and like Professor Torrance viewed the person as a moral agent with moral judgement and spiritual accountability, relational and with a need for intimacy.

An informal discussion time in small groups followed, as people relaxed and became more vocal together. After lunch, the third speaker took the floor. John Wyatt is Professor of Perinatology at Imperial College, London. He preferred to deal with the question, "WHEN is a person", looking at both ends of life; he saw a circle from dependency through being depended upon and back to dependency. Speaking movingly of his own mother's death from Alzheimer's disease, he affirmed the value of life even in such circumstances, and

likewise took a strong position on the value of one cell at the beginning of its journey into life.

Following workshops on such issues as Ethics and Genetics and the opportunity to replace and transplant organs to prolong and improve life, there was a final question and answer session where many varying views on these topics were expressed.

I came away from this satisfying day with a very tired brain; also with three publications for further thought – the Church of Scotland’s view on voluntary euthanasia; John Stott’s final book, “The Radical Disciple” and Professor Wyatt’s “Matters of Life and Death”. I can feel a book review coming on...

News from Peru

Appeal for the Sacred Valley Boys Home.

During January you may have heard a snippet on a news programme about tourists having to be airlifted from Machu Picchu due to flooding and landslides. What we didn't realise then was the devastating effect that this would have on those known to us further down the valley.

For the last two years teams have gone out from Barclay/Viewforth to Peru to work as part of a Vine Trust workparty. There they have helped to build new homes for the many boys living on the streets. The Sacred Valley boys' home, near Urubamba, is one of the places where our hand-made adobe bricks have been put to use and it was great to see the progress with the building work when we were back there last summer.

Sadly I now have to report that the boys' home is no more, having been washed away by the floods. There is basically nothing left of the building. The good news is that for months and months Hector (the house father for Cusco) has been saving money from his budget because he really felt like God had placed on his heart to take all of the 42 boys plus more volunteers and staff workers on holiday to one of the other campsites just south of Lima on the Pacific Ocean. Most of the children had never seen the ocean before, and Hector really wanted them to see it. The holiday was originally planned for the first two weeks of January, but at the last minute a situation came up which forced them to change it to the last two weeks of January. God's timing is impeccable.... as, while they were away, the water arrived at the home in a flash flood in the middle of the night and almost immediately covered over the bottom level of all of the boys' bunk beds. Eventually it rose to the top level of the bunk beds too. The building is made out of the traditional mud adobe bricks, and it has now been washed away. I can't imagine the tragedy that would have happened had the boys not been on holiday.

The boys are still at Kawai (near Lima) but will move soon to rented

temporary accommodation back in the Sacred Valley. It is hoped that construction of a new home will be possible in the next 12 months provided a new site can be identified soon.

What can we do to help?

There are immediate needs as most of the belongings from the home have been damaged or lost. Therefore the Vine Trust are launching an appeal to replace lost clothing and equipment and to assist with the eventual replacing of the home.

all types of unwanted textiles including adults' and children's clothes, paired shoes, hats, bags, belts, curtains, towels and bed linen.



WHY?

Your old or unwanted things can help raise money for the street children in Peru.

HOW? Bring your things along to the Pillar Hall at Barclay Viewforth Church on **Sundays 7th or 14th March** (*please don't bring anything along before then as we will have a storage problem*). The Peru Team will then put all the items together in special 'Rag Bags', which will then be collected and weighed. The Vine Trust will then receive a cheque based on the weight of the bags.

What Happens to the Textiles?

Textiles are sorted into about 40 different types, graded according to quality and then baled at the factory in Denny, Central Scotland for reuse or recycling. Good quality textiles are exported to parts of Africa, Asia and Eastern Europe, providing good quality affordable second hand clothing. Poor quality textiles are shredded and used as mattress fillers and industrial wiping cloths e.g. for oil and printing industries.

Barclay United

United's recent "Consolation Cup" first round match commenced in mirror image opposites of fortune on and off the field.



Inside the opening minute against Ps and Gs, a Daniel Gallagher through pass was glided onto by Billy Somerville who from the edge of the penalty area duly converted to record United's fastest ever goal. Half an hour earlier the players had been sitting in the changing room wondering if they would be playing in half a dozen green practice bibs! This followed a mix up with the team shirts having been left in an absent player's car.

Fortunately the fans came to the rescue in the form of last season's supporter of the year, Elaine Hogan, who swiftly arranged for us to borrow away jerseys from Lepra, another church team present on the morning at Dalkeith Community School playing fields. Clad in un-

familiar white, a less than fully fit United eleven therefore hobbled onto the knobbly frozen pitch in bright mid January sunshine. After some conferring by the team captains with referee Campbell Duncan, unmissable in resplendent orange, the game was given the go ahead.

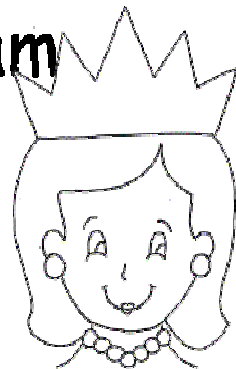
