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
## What does a locum do?

Dear Friends,

First, thank you for the warm welcome that so many people and children have given me during the last two months. It is indeed a joy and privilege to serve at Barclay Viewforth Church as a locum and thank you to everyone who has helped and advised me so far. But what should a locum do at BVC during this particular vacancy, you might ask.

There is a highly committed ministry team comprising Elaine Hogan, Stefanie Conradt and Julie Nicholson, who between them cover pastoral, children and families, and administration. They work faithfully in keeping day to day matters moving along as smoothly as possible during the vacancy.

In addition, BVC has an experienced Session Clerk in John Ritchie and a caring group of Kirk Session elders who along with the interim moderator Ian MacDonald are ensuring that vacancy matters are progressed as efficiently as possible, as well as ensuring finance, property and administrative matters are run smoothly. There are also very able Christian leaders



The obvious answer, of course, is to help lead some of the services of worship,

which is one of the privileges of being a locum. However, with Elaine, Stefanie, Shirley Fraser, Connect Plus (leading Ability Sunday), Fiona Tweedie, Iain Sutherland, Nikki Kirkland, Ian Macdonald and Sam Torrens all helping us through the vacancy, for which we are most grateful, I am not needed to lead worship every week. Where else can a locum help, support and encourage people in the Christian faith?

The Kirk Session invited me to the elders' conference in June, and that gave me some ideas of where my Christian leadership and efforts might be needed. Three areas were apparent.

First, there is a need to revitalise our congregation's house groups. The idea that emerged was to have a 'starters' Bible group' that might lead to new groups being formed. Currently, there are two active house groups. Hence we have started the Christian faith/five Church of Scotland vows Bible meetings that run on Thursdays and Sundays. For many of us, we are reminding ourselves of the Church of Scotland vows that we took many years ago. Others

are exploring such Christian vows for the first time. Let us take time out from our usual busy weeks, think again about our core Christian beliefs, and rededicate ourselves to God's service.

Second, we currently do not have a weekly congregational prayer meeting and yet the monthly prayer meetings on the third Sunday of each month (09:30–10:20) are well supported – people need prayer – and a church family



needs to pray at all times. We will launch a regular weekly prayer time soon. Please let me know what day and time suits you.

Third, people sometimes grow into a church family through social activities, as BVC has demonstrated successfully over the decades. Many of the meetings of the first Christian communities involved meeting over a meal. Our strawberry tea held on 10 August was an impromptu get-together, and a time of fellowship was enjoyed by many. Let's continue to have more socials in the autumn and winter months and make everyone feel part of the church family.



## Vacancy update

The group preparing the **Parish Profile**, which will give details of our congregation to potential applicants, has completed its draft. Kirk Session met at the end of August to consider the document. You will be able to read the profile when it is published on our website. (Indeed, as you read this, it may already be there.)

We are finalising the **Electoral Register** of people who can elect our **Nominating Committee**. That committee will consider applicants, go to hear them preach, and conduct interviews. Members are automatically on the Electoral Register, but regular worshippers (adherents) who are not members of the congregation can also ask to be added. The required form will be made available for the first two Sundays in September, but please contact the church office if you will not be in church those weeks but would like a copy.



The election of the Nominating Committee should take place after the morning service on Sunday 22 September. We will be filling 11 posts, and election is by secret ballot of those who are on the Electoral Register and are present at the meeting. Voting by proxy is not possible.

Ideally we would like to have a Nominating Committee that reflects the diversity of the Barclay Viewforth congregation, and I would encourage you to prayerfully consider who might be proposed. Those nominated must themselves be on the Electoral Register, and their agreement is needed (as is a nominator and seconder). Ministers and deacons (in both cases including those retired) and employees of the congregation are not able to serve on the Nominating Committee. The big request is for you to consider this in advance and, if you are thinking of nominating someone, please speak to them first so they can consider before the meeting on the 22nd.

## **God of surprises**

In the last edition of the magazine I wrote the first in a series about what we can learn from trees – or what God is showing us through trees. Here is part two.

This sycamore stands among many magnificent trees in the Astley Ainsley hospital grounds. What made this tree stand out for me? It literally spoke to me one day when I was walking past it. I suddenly heard a cacophony of noise emanating from the tree. It made me stop and look. I was looking up into the branches when suddenly a jackdaw appeared from a slit in the trunk. Another day I returned and waited expectantly. All was silent. But there was a jackdaw in the trees behind me, obviously waiting for the right timing. I



made myself more inconspicuous and patience paid off. The jackdaw approached the tree and eventually swooped in, and its young celebrated with the wonderful noise that I had heard the previous week. I went closer, and caught the parent leaving. A seemingly



standard, and not particularly spectacular, tree held a special secret. And that secret I now share.

God can be described as a God of surprises. You never know what might happen next. Isn't that a wonderful thing! As long as it's a surprise rather than a shock, which can obviously have a very different effect on us. In the normal and everyday, there can be special things waiting for us. We

need to take some time with God and listen, and wait. That's something we need to learn as Christians, which can be very hard if we don't have a patient kind of personality. But the rewards will be worth it. And if we spend time waiting on God, and listening out for what he has for us, isn't it time well spent rather than time wasted. This image of an old 'boring' tree might also be an example of how we shouldn't judge others. I could have walked past this tree 100 times without knowing there was anything else going on – that there was new life growing inside, waiting to emerge. And so, perhaps we should remember that we don't know what's going on inside another person, whether struggles, or the magical workings of God's kingdom. We might look exactly the same in other people's eyes, but we are all different – all special. With God at work in us, we change and grow.

## **Worship at Barclay Viewforth Church**

**Sunday Morning Services**. We celebrated the coming of the Holy Spirit on the Day of Pentecost in June, and since then we have continued to follow the Acts of the Apostles, which could easily have been called the Acts of the Holy Spirit. Acts reveals how the Holy Spirit helped ordinary people to become extraordinary evangelists and change the world. We will meet a number of these new Christians while we focus on Acts most Sunday mornings until November.

My prayer is that through the systematic reading of Acts we will learn from role models of the early Christian communities and our faith will be stronger than ever. All of us need to have a robust Christian faith. None of us are protected against misfortune, ill health and sadness. However, we counter sad and bad news with the joy of knowing that nothing can separate us from Jesus Christ, the Holy Spirit and God our Father.

We are meant to worship together, pray together and serve God through life together. My prayer is that we will all sense God's presence in our midst as we go through this vacancy period or time of trial, as we say in some versions of the Lord's Prayer.

If you would like to learn more about the Acts of the Apostles than we can cover on Sunday mornings, please let me know. We can always study the Acts of the Apostles together and learn from one another.

**Sunday Evening Services**. As in the morning services, we will be reading through a complete book, namely the First Letter to the Thessalonians. We have chosen this because it is one of the Paul's first letters, written long before the Gospels.

In October, we will look at some topical subjects. We need to hear what the Bible tells us about current affairs, particularly when there is so much uncertainty in the country and the world today.

In November, we plan to look at relationships between individuals and groups within a church family. We often say that the Christian faith and our church is open to people of all faiths and none, but how do we welcome and integrate people who are lonely, who live alone, who are bereaved, who are coping with mental, physical, emotional or spiritual illnesses? What does the Bible tell us about such issues?

May the Grace of God help us all to grow in faith together at all our services of worship.

## Football update

# Kitchen notes: store cupboard pasta sauce

This summer has been a wonderful mix of time relaxing in Edinburgh and time away. One of the best parts of going on holiday is sampling new and different foods (along with not having to do the washing up!). However there is nothing better than the first proper cup of tea when you get home.

Having had a couple of weeks off from the kitchen I really enjoyed the chance to cook a simple pasta dish for a small group of friends. I didn't really use a recipe to make the pasta sauce but used the veggies I had in the fridge and then served it with pasta, grated cheese and garlic bread.

- 1 red onion
- 1 pepper
- 1 courgette
- 1 box of mushrooms
- 1 head of broccoli
- 1 jar of olives
- 1 box of passata
- 1 bunch of fresh basil
- 2 cloves of garlic



- 1. Chop the onions and gently fry. Add in the chopped peppers and chopped garlic.
- 2. Break the broccoli into small florets and add to the pan.
- 3. Thinly slice the courgette and chop the mushrooms, and add to the pan.
- 4. When the vegetables are almost cooked, add the passata, olives and chopped basil, and simmer. Season with salt and pepper.

### Freedom!



As a result I spent most of the week stuck indoors. For even a simple thing like posting a letter, I had to rely on someone posting it for me or else wait until I could get out to do it myself.

So how did I pass the time? By studying. I did many courses online and gained certificates and diplomas.

I have recently been successful in moving into accessible accommodation, and I now have an electric wheelchair. I am out every day! I can do my own shopping, meet friends and go to the gym. I am going to be taking up disability sports.

Thank you to everyone who has helped me in so many different ways over the last three years, especially helping me get to church. I am very grateful to each and every one of you. Now that I have an electric wheelchair I can whizz about on my own.
