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Journeys

Over the Advent season we may find ourselves taking more 'journeys' than usual. It could be journeys to visit family or friends, or more frequent journeys to the shops or post office. Others may face journeys to doctors or hospital, or even journeys to see loved ones off on their final journey. Every journey will have its own story – from adventures at airport security through to standing in a long queue at the post office with all your cards and parcels ready for posting only to remember that your purse is sitting on the counter top at home. There may be journeys filled with fear and frustration, but there will also be ones laden with happiness and joy.

Watching people head off on a journey or arrive at their destination at airports and railway stations can be exciting too. I love people watching at these places – hundreds of travellers at the beginning or the end of their journey and



the tears of those seeing them off, or the anticipation of those waiting for people to arrive. The reunions – the sheer joy which lights up faces as loved ones and good friends are reunited. That's probably why one of my top Christmas films is *Love Actually*. It starts at the airport and features many people on their own personal journeys through life – starting a new job; coping with bereavement; friendships; and much more. Inevitably, as in most of our Christmas movies, all ends well and it's that feel-good factor which draws us to watch them every year. However, our daily lives are often filled with journeys which don't have such happy endings. It's at these times that we, sometimes as a last resort, turn to God. We might cry out, "Why, God...?" We may never understand, but we can draw strength from the One who comforts us in all our troubles. We have to journey through the pain/ anger/frustration/disappointment/grief knowing that He will hold our hand.

Scripture gives us many examples of people on difficult journeys – the Christmas story itself being the start of the most important one. That journey, foretold in the Old Testament (Isaiah 9), continued through Mary and Joseph's trek to Bethlehem (Luke 1-2) for the birth of Jesus, through to walking the road to Golgotha, carrying a heavy wooden cross. That journey did not end there and, in fact, is one still in progress as we journey with the resurrected Jesus in our daily lives. What tremendous HOPE that gives us when we face our difficult journeys. What tremendous joy it gives us as we walk and celebrate the easier journeys.

If you face difficult journeys in the coming weeks, know that you are not alone. You can

also call on us to help you or walk with you on your journey. Love actually did come down at Christmas all those years ago. May you each experience Christ's love this Christmas and always.



Helping the Homeless – a Practical Opportunity

For many years the Edinburgh charity Bethany Christian Trust has provided a number of programmes to assist the homeless. One is the Care Shelter, providing people who are rough sleeping with a place to go for the night: a place where they can find shelter, a hot meal and a warm place to sleep for more than seven months of each year.



Over this time, churches close to the city centre

have provided a venue on a rota basis for up to 60 or 70 people each night. Barclay Viewforth has provided teams to both host the event and to cook the evening meal. Earlier this year a permanent venue was found at Diadem, a church building at the junction of Gorgie Road and Chesser Avenue. Planning permission issues have so far prevented its use so far this winter – although we understand that it is due to open on 2 December. Gorgie Church is providing the venue at the moment.

Having a (reasonably) fixed venue is beneficial for the users. However, a large number of different churches from Edinburgh and the surrounding area still provide the evening meal. Barclay Viewforth has provided a catering team on a number of dates in the past, and there is an opportunity to continue this service at the new venue

On an evening, a team would comprise five or six people, with one of them designated as team leader. Members would assist in the preparation and serving of the meal to those using the service. The leader would be able to decide on a menu for a simple two-course meal, organising the buying of the food, the cooking and serving, and supervising the others in the team. It is likely that each member would volunteer for a couple of evenings each year.

If you are interested in hearing more about this, or in being part of a Barclay Viewforth team, please have a word with me. If you don't know me please ask one of the Welcome team, or you may find me at the Sound Desk. Alternatively please contact me via the Church Office.

Bethany provides a much-needed service to Edinburgh's many homeless/rough sleepers, and this is a chance to contribute your time and talents to a worthwhile cause.


Vacancy News: Nominating Committee Update

Days with trees

Kitchen notes: coconut ice

With the approach of Christmas, it feels a bit like time is running away from me, the diary is starting to overflow and the to-do list seems to grow exponentially every time I look at it. However, as well as being one of the busiest times of the year, it is my favourite time of the year. I am already starting to plan my day of sweetiemaking for Christmas presents. I still feel a novice when it comes to sweetie-making and tend to stick to the easier recipes that are a bit more forgiving. I now have a number of recipes that I do most years and then I try something new as well. I generally make Mum Coconut Ice each year, as she loves coconut but rarely has it due



to both Dad and I being allergic to it. This is a really easy recipe to make with children, although be warned – you will be very sticky by the end. I have a feeling I scale it up to use a full tin of condensed milk, unless I have other recipes that can use up the leftovers.

- 200g condensed milk
- 225g icing sugar
- 175g desiccated coconut
- 1 drop of red food colouring (optional)
- 1. Mix together the condensed milk and icing sugar. Stir in the coconut (mixture should be very stiff) and divide in half. Colour one half of the mixture pale pink and keep mixing until you have an even colour.
- 2. Double-line a small plastic box with baking parchment or cling film before placing the white coconut ice in the bottom, pressing it into a bar shape. Form the pink coconut ice into a similar shape and press firmly together.
- 3. Leave 2-3 hours until firm and cut into squares. Keep refrigerated in an airtight container and use within three weeks.

Advent challenge



You might think that the run-up to Christmas is challenging enough without adding anything extra to your day – and, believe me, I feel the same. But there is also something to be gained in challenging yourself to do something a bit different. So here I am, suggesting a few possibilities.

Recently I met with my spiritual director and discussed what could bring me more life this advent season. One thing which gives me joy and life is doing creative things, but they are often squeezed out from my daily routine with everything else that's going on. Regular readers will have seen some of the products of a previous creative/spiritual challenge which I undertook between Easter and Pentecost – my 'days with trees' (see page 6 for the latest one). From 1 December I am going to make 'advent cards'. These are not greetings cards, but just a piece of card on which I will write a word or phrase each day that has inspired me from a book or service, or something someone has said, or even something that God has spoken to me. 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Opening the doors

Now, as ever, the communities for which Barclay Viewforth provides are in need of this good news – and as we look to invite more people to our family, this example is ours to follow.

In particular, the city's youth – the up-and-coming generation of world-shapers – have an extraordinary capacity to seek and pursue their passions, but also an unsatisfied longing for good news. My generation craves authenticity from a world so often lacking it, and it is surely saddening that they often don't find it in the church.

How do we open our doors? Perhaps I don't have solutions – only questions to consider. Have we put down any roadblocks for anyone who wishes to come to our church?
