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#### **Pastoral Letter**

I hope you've all been managing to enjoy the 'freedom' that the easing of lockdown restrictions has brought. Sadly, it looks as though we may be heading for another lockdown and that will bring fear or a few anxieties for some. I've been reminded on a few occasions recently that perfect love drives out fear. (1 John 4:19). Let me give you a couple of examples....

I sometimes like to go out for a walk either just before or just after breakfast before the working day begins. It's a time to clear the head and focus on God's wonderful creation and give thanks. I will sometimes take a photo or two (which may often appear in services). One morning recently the day started with sunshine (there's nothing like a walk in the sunshine to raise the spirits!) As I was heading across



Bruntsfield Links I took my phone out to take a couple of photos. Inadvertently I ended up with this photo (I'd only meant to capture the beauty of the sunshine and Arthur's Seat). The camera captured the sun as if it was a globe on the lamppost. I didn't see this as I took the photo, only after. I know that some people would spend some time lining up such a shot. I looked at the photo on the screen and was amazed at the message. Jesus is the light of the world and that

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light will shine for us on good days and in the dark places of our lives. It was a real 'Wow!' moment.

Another walk early on Sunday morning on a darker, drizzly day (reflecting a little of the way I was feeling) brought another reminder of God's goodness. The leaves are turning, with a few falling to the ground. Sometimes fallen leaves can create a wonderful photo, especially with the amazing array of colours. My eye was attracted to this leaf, but it wasn't just the colour.

Look closely at all the 'veins' on the leaf. It's a perfect creation. Having captured the photograph I walked home, marvelling at God's creation, even down to the perfect detail on that one leaf. God created this minor miracle... and He created each of us...in His likeness. Every single fibre of our being, He created... "and it was good!"

For me, these photos are a reminder of God's perfect love.

Can I encourage you in the days and weeks ahead to intentionally look for God in the small things (as well as the large). You might be surprised where you will meet Him. I hope that these reminders give you hope so that you might draw on God's strength to face the days ahead.

Jesus said in John 16:33

"I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world."



## **Obituary: Andrew Robertson**

Members and friends of Barclay Viewforth will be saddened to learn of the death of Andrew Robertson on 21 September 2020.

He had suffered a major heart attack, and after treatment in Edinburgh had been transferred to the Jubilee Hospital in Glasgow. However, he subsequently suffered a cardiac arrest and other complications from which he sadly died some days later. He was 48.

Andrew had been one of our organists since the union with Viewforth 11 years ago, in addition to being our choirmaster. Prior to this, he had been organist and Music Group leader at Viewforth for 15 years. He was born into the Viewforth Church family and his musical journey started early in life, with him taking part in many musical productions as a member of the Junior Choir there. He learned to play the piano whilst



still at primary school, although he was mainly self-taught and initially played by ear. As an adult, he played the piano for the younger section of the Sunday Club and also taught himself to play the organ. He was then organist at Viewforth from September 1994 until the union and led the Music Group in both weekly services and various events. During the final ministry there he enjoyed selecting the music and songs for the main morning service. Although he enjoyed traditional hymns, he was always keen to support the introduction of new songs, preferably those with easy to sing tunes!

From the union which created Barclay Viewforth in 2009, he shared organist duties with Dennis Deas and then Michael Bonaventure. He also led the Choir who sing at morning services and special events.



Away from church, upon finishing school, Andrew studied at Moray House. He became a teacher at St Francis' Primary School in Niddrie and taught in the infant department there for his entire career, where his music skills would also be put to good use.

At home, he enjoyed entertaining, cooking and baking and his shortbread was said to be second to none. He married Brian three years ago and they enjoyed travelling together. He especially loved the Christmas season, both at home and at church. Each year his garage was transformed into a magical wonderland with decorations and thousands of lights and Andrew often spent part of his autumn holiday each year in Blackpool buying new items for the display. The resulting spectacle was visited by adults and children, who were also

given an audience with Santa Claus as well as being treated to refreshments afterwards. Visitors would return every year to see what new magic Andrew had created, and over the years numerous charities benefitted from his efforts.

At Viewforth he enjoyed playing for children's parties. The Music Group Christmas Carol Parties were an important event in his musical calendar.

At both churches, there was a spirit of re-union as friends from earlier times would come along to add their Advent voices to the morning and Christmas Eve services. His Christmas ties and colourful waistcoats were legendary.

Our thoughts and prayers go out to Brian, to Andrew's mother Betty, his sister Susan and her family, and his pupils and many friends. We will remember him for bringing joy to so many.

## O for a thousand tongues

If you either saw (or listened to) the 11am service or attended the 3pm service on Sunday 13
September you will have heard this song. I did both. At the 11am, in the comfort of my own home, I sang along to the six verses of that famous Wesley hymn. When it started playing during the afternoon service, I was sitting in the Barclay Viewforth sanctuary, experiencing my first live 'inperson' service since lockdown. As we aren't permitted to sing



under current restrictions, I closed my eyes when the music started. Earlier, at the Church Online platform, Moray had commented that he could hear Bill singing from the choir. As I sat in church and heard our voices recorded only a few months ago, I visualised the congregation around me. Although it didn't sound as it would in real life with the voices all around, it still sounded like us. And I found the experience quite powerful and moving. That song, which was written in 1739 (and originally had 18 stanzas), is much older than Barclay Viewforth. But during the 156 years that our building has been standing, that hymn must have been sung by thousands and thousands of different voices. And so it felt very appropriate that it was played there. Despite it being like never before, those recorded voices were adding to the communal worship that has taken place year after year in that place, through good times and bad.

That hymn of course has a story. Charles had been suffering from pleurisy, a lung disease caused by a virus which causes breathing problems. At the same time he was doubting his faith. His fellow Christians gathered around to help him, both physically and spiritually. The hymn was born out of his recovery. In this new time of virus which causes breathing problems, let us hold onto the the fact, that even in times of great trial, and even if we doubt God, we can come through and our fellow Christians can help support us. The challenges today are different, and the separation that we feel from each other may cause us a lot of sadness. But we are here for each other, and we can pray for each other, even if we don't know what else to do. And we can sing. Even if we are at home by ourselves. We can continue to praise God.

#### More than a rainbow

Noah. A story that has been at the forefront of my mind at various points over the last 6 months. The visual reminder of so many rainbows on display in windows, pavement chalk art, even on the railings outside of church seemed to act as a prompt for this well known story. We have even had the more recent church services using Noah's story, and I'm left wondering what else is God telling me at this point in time through this well known passage?

At the moment I feel I can relate best to the post storm pre-docking part of the story, the storm has calmed yet the ark is still floating around, the safety and comfort of dry land is nowhere to be seen, there is no timeframe for the "next stage" it's a sense of limbo. I certainly feel like that is the case currently in my day to day life. I'm able to see people and do more than I could back in April yet at the same time everyday life is still restricted; no hugs for friends, meeting up with limited numbers of people, keeping distance, no singing, no impromptu gatherings, all result in a reluctance to plan too much incase the regulations change.

Even once the ark had grounded there was still a long period of waiting to be endured. How did Noah and his family feel as they released the Raven and then the Dove the first time, did those feeling change when they came back to the ark? The next time they released the Dove was it with a sense of anticipation and excitement of maybe this time there will be a sign that the water levels are receding and they would be able to plan for leaving the ark or was it with a resigned sense of what's the point it's all just so wet underfoot still? Maybe I'm left questioning what is my attitude at the moment, do I have an underlying sense of it will all get better, or am I feeling like the water level is never going to receded and we are stuck in this limbo state permanently.

Actually what is important is I have that reoccurring visual reminder of God's covenant with Noah which in turn prompts me to remember that when God promises us something, he means it. Whether I feel like I'm in the middle of a storm or stranded on a mountain top, or stood on dry land enjoying his wonderful creation I can hang onto this verse from Deuteronomy 31:8. 'The Lord himself goes before you and will be with you; he will never



leave you nor forsake you. Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged'. Many of us might be feeling isolated from friends and family still, yet we are not completely alone, God is still walking with us and he has everything under control.

3. Food bank at Bruntsfield Evangelical Church

Winter might be a time where we encourage people to bring more donations to church to support the work of the local food bank. The food bank continues to operate, but member have to take donations directly there on a Friday morning.



Because of the restrictions in 2020 we have decided to offer these three organisations financial help through the giving of our members. ## In person services: planning for the rest of the year

The numbers attending the **3pm Sunday services** have not come close to fully using the available capacity of the church, and have declined slightly over the initial 4 weeks. Feedback from those attending has been that they miss being able to share fellowship before and after the service (prohibited by the current guidance). Not being able to have any congregational singing also makes it feel quite different from pre-lockdown worship. Of those who have attended the 3pm service, nearly all also watch services online.

It was agreed by Kirk Session that we would continue the 3pm services as planned until Sunday 11 October, but after that a rethink was needed.



Kirk Session spent some time considering whether an **All-Age Morning Service** was the best option, to ensure the congregation kept contact with as many families and children as possible. There were mixed views from the parents at the meeting on how popular this would be, and this reflected the range of opinion from discussions people had had with other families. The online materials were well liked, and many felt this worked better than a service in the sanctuary would, at least the kind of service we can hold under the current restrictions.

On balance it was agreed that a **more traditional 11am Service** would work better. It could contain pre-recorded elements, including worship songs, but with a sermon given in the sanctuary by the minister. Prayers and bible readings could be pre-recorded also, but these might also be led live in the sanctuary on occasion. Live music, including organ music, can be included under the current guidance. This service would be live-streamed on the internet.

As with the afternoon service, attendance at the 11am service will need to be pre-booked, and there will be a limited number of seats available (currently 50, but this may change if government guidance is updated).

An earlier 10.15am Service online only, aimed at children and families, will continue.

It will take some time to get the Sanctuary ready for live-streaming, and so we will return to services online only for a few weeks after 11 October. The plan is to then 'reopen' for an 11am service on Sunday 15 November.
