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A letter from lockdown

This is perhaps the most unusual letter I have ever written. I am the minister of Barclay Viewforth Parish Church, but I've only been in the building twice: once for interview and once to preach as nominee. My induction was carried out online and has been viewed over 2000 times, but I could only see a handful of people from Presbytery. I've met regularly with the staff on Zoom and caught up with a few folk at the prayer meeting and bible study, but it's just not possible to do the kind of things that would help me get to know other people. Some of you will not even have seen a picture of me yet! We're still living in Prestwick, but hoping work in the manse can be finished off and we can finally move across in the next few weeks. It has been an unsettling time for us, but we know that we're not alone.

The last few months have resulted in unprecedented changes for our country and the church. None of us would have imagined a time when all of our buildings would be closed and we would not be able to meet. Many people have had to cancel weddings. Other celebrations are postponed. Families have had the extra pain of not being able to attend the funerals of loved ones.

Listen to services over the phone...

Don't have a computer or internet access? Want to listen to to our services/sermons by phone? This facility has now been set up – the number to call is **0131 357 6007**. There will be a welcome from David, followed by a reading and the sermon, a prayer and a hymn. You don't have to listen to the whole thing – you can hang up at any time.

We know that many people have found the lockdown hard – and as I write this it is Mental Health Week where we're encouraged to recognise those who struggle in this area and offer support and encouragement. One of the things I have seen online and in the press is talk of a loss of hope and that brought this passage to mind:

Lamentations 3:19 (NIV)

- ¹⁹ I remember my affliction and my wandering, the bitterness and the gall.
- ²⁰ I well remember them,and my soul is downcast within me.
- ²¹ Yet this I call to mind and therefore I have hope:
- ²² Because of the Lord's great love we are not consumed, for his compassions never fail.
- ²³ They are new every morning; great is your faithfulness.
- ²⁴ I say to myself, "The Lord is my portion; therefore I will wait for him."



I don't want to minimise the difficulties people have, or suggest that there is any easy answer to mental health issues, or even to loneliness. Nor I am suggesting that God's people never suffer from such issues – there are many examples in the Bible and they are not all resolved. That's not the point of the reading. It is, though, good to be reminded that as God's children we can have hope, and the way to get it is to remind ourselves of who God is and what he's done. Although we don't always 'feel' it, God gives us new blessings each day. He is faithful to his promises and when we trust God we will find that hope rises in us.

We need to be careful though. This doesn't just happen. In the midst of real trial the writer didn't just get up one day and suddenly find everything was fantastic. He had to actively decide to focus on God – and it was only then that hope came. We don't know if his other circumstances had changed, but I suspect not. What had changed was his perspective. He decided to 'wait' on God: to choose to focus on God, to talk to God, to listen to God, to think of God's promises and faithfulness.

If we're honest, the situation for the Church of Scotland as an institution looks difficult. Too few ministers, too many buildings, a huge deficit and falling membership. If ever there was a time to wait for God and have hope renewed this is it. Actually, more people are viewing online services than attended services (I know many of us are watching more than one, but many of those who usually attend aren't watching any!) and congregations have shown incredible creativity during the lockdown. There is hope. There are good things still to come. God hasn't changed. His faithfulness endures.

Rev David Clarkson - an interview

On Wednesday 29 April 2020 Rev David Clarkson was inducted as the new minister of Barclay Viewforth Church, Edinburgh. However, it wasn't the usual grand service with Presbytery procession, 'raise the roof hymn singing', followed by the ubiquitous bun-fight. Due to lockdown, Presbytery had to proceed *pro re nata* – 'in the circumstances' – and inducted David via zoom. David and his wife, Linda, are still living in Monkton in Prestwick, but hope to move to Edinburgh once restrictions are eased.

Prior to his induction, David was interviewed via Zoom about his background and what brought him to Barclay Viewforth Church. The following is a snapshot of that interview (the whole interview is available on our YouTube channel – search for **BV Church**).

David I was born in the 2nd half of the last century in Kilwinning, in Ayrshire, but the family moved around a lot as my father was a secondary school teacher. After school I went to Carlisle and trained as a radiographer and from there I joined the

police. I was too short for Dumfries and Galloway, but met the criteria for Northern Constabulary. I spent 19 years in the police based in Dornoch, Stornoway, Balallan in Lewis, Inverness, and Thurso. It was a great experience.



- Elaine How did you come to faith? A 'burning bush' moment or a dawning realisation?
- **David** I came from a Brethren background, but realised there was a growing awareness of Jesus in my life. At some point, it all really made sense to me.
- Elaine Tell us some more about the story of your call to ministry.
- **David** I had made enquiries about ministry when stationed in Balallan but was perhaps doing it for the wrong reasons. When I moved to Inverness, I started training to be a Reader in the Church of Scotland. I then led services when my police work allowed. I left the police and signed up for International Christian College in Glasgow. We (David and Linda) felt that we were meant to be missionaries in Japan, but after a visit there for a month we realised it wasn't meant for us. I came back and was encouraged to start the enquiry process for the Church of Scotland. During a spell as a locum in Port Glasgow, I realised that God was calling me into ministry.
- **Elaine** We often quote Jeremiah 29:11: "For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." Your story is an example of God discerning His plan for you even though you may want to resist.
- **David** I would never have left the police to go into ministry...but God did what He had to do to get me where I was supposed to be.

- Elaine You've been in Monkton and Prestwick North Church for nearly 10 years...what was it that attracted you to Barclay Viewforth?
- **David** Well, I have to be honest...ministers receive copies of church profiles regularly...and I don't often read them. I was the interim moderator for a church in Ayr and was helping them look for some parish profiles. As I read the BVC one I began to think, "Oh....oh! Oh no!" It had lots of



the things I was looking for in a congregation. (Among other things)...BVC appeared to be willing to look at new ways of engaging, serving and being and that's what attracted me to it. I'm really looking forward to coming and getting involved.

- Elaine Some lightweight questions... what is your favourite hobby?
- **David** As I'm still studying, I don't have much time for hobbies....but I do love cooking... more savoury than anything, although I do a really good pavlova.
- Elaine Football or rugby...and which is your favourite team?
- **David** Neither really, although when we were in Inverness we liked to support Inverness Caley Thistle. I like the 6 Nations rugby and it will be nice to get to some of the games at Murrayfield when we come to Edinburgh.
- Elaine When you are eventually able to visit folks at home...tea or coffee?
- David Definitely coffee. Good coffee.
- Elaine Favourite Bible verse and why?
- **David** It's from the Old Testament understanding the OT is vital. It's Zephaniah 3:17 The Lord your God is with you,

the Mighty Warrior who saves.

He will take great delight in you;

in his love he will no longer rebuke you,

but will rejoice over you with singing.'

It's that idea that here is God all powerful, who looks at us and thinks, "Wow! You're amazing. I'm going to sing about you." I find that amazing that God sees us as people that are worth rejoicing over and singing about.

Elaine - David, we look forward to welcoming you here in person at some time in the future and seeing what God has planned for all of us.

Please pray for David and Linda as they seek to minister from afar, and as they try to get to know us in these difficult conditions.

As ever, your prayers for all those on Session are appreciated; please particularly remember the seven named above, as well as the work in mission and witness across our congregation.


