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Pastoral letter

Dear Friends,

As I write this letter we have just gone through an emotional Easter Sunday service. Not only did we celebrate Jesus' resurrection, but we also celebrated the end of 14 years of Sam's ministry at Barclay Viewforth Church. I hope that we were able to do justice to both. Sam's departure leaves a big hole – not only in our ministry team, but also in our hearts.

Where next?

We're told in scripture, "Do not worry.." (Matthew 6:25-34 - a passage which will be preached on at the start of our new series, "Thy Kingdom Come"). God does enough worrying for all of us! He will be the One who will see us through this next step in our journey. He may even encourage one or two of you to 'step out of the boat' and join us in helping to lead our services over the vacancy. Whatever happens, the gospel of Jesus Christ will continue to be preached at BVC. There may be times that it will not reach the high standard that's come to be expected at BVC, but we are all disciples on this journey and God will continue to teach and encourage us as we go.

It may be that 'worrying about who the next minister might be' is not high on your list of priorities at this time as you have other concerns



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which are causing you to worry: ill health; job situation; worry about family/friends in difficult situations; bereavement;... please know that you do not have to face these worries alone... "Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God." Philippians 4:6

If you struggle to find the right words...God won't worry about it. We should be like the child who runs home from school bursting to share with his/her parents all that's happened that day, the good and bad. The words come tumbling out, incoherently at times, but the parent can make sense of them all...and so God does with our jumbled thoughts and words. God doesn't care if our words come with scripted eloquence or mumblings from our hearts. Just being in communication with Him can make such a difference.

If you would like someone to pray for you – phone a friend! Or, let the ministry team know. We can sit down with you after a service, or at an arranged time during the week. We also still have the online prayer circle – you can write down your prayer request (anonymously if you wish) on the cards at the back of the church, and drop it into the Prayer Request box. This will be circulated to the people who have signed up to pray for others.

Let's continue to pray for each other, those in our church family and those beyond it. Continue to pray for Sam and Minnie as they prepare to step out into the "mission field" across the city. Pray also that God will continue to guard and guide our footsteps though this vacancy.

We may not know – at this point – what the future holds, but we know who holds the future. May we all be aware of God's love and have a sense of His peace in the coming weeks.


A thank you from Sam...





Barclay Viewforth vacancy: what will happen next?

If, like the editor, you have joined BVC in the last 14 years, you might not know what happens during a vacancy and how we go about appointing a new minister. This is an outline of the process, which is expected to take at least a year to complete.





The congregation will appoint a **Nominating Committee**. Presbytery tell us how many people we can appoint – it is likely to be around 10.

There are some people who are not allowed to be on the Committee (such as employees of the church). Otherwise, all members of the electoral roll are eligible to be nominated.

To join the Committee, you must be proposed by two people (and you must agree that you are happy to do it!). If more people are nominated than spaces on the committee, there will be a vote to decide who is on the Committee



The Nominating Committee writes a **Parish Profile** describing who we are, where we are going, who we are looking for as our new minister, and information on fabric and finances. This acts as the "job advert" to tell potential ministers about our church. Ministers will, we hope, apply and the Nominating Committee will then review the candidates. This normally includes hearing them lead a service, as well as interviewing them.



In most cases, the Nominating Committee propose one candidate as **sole nominee**. This candidate will be invited to lead a service, and then those on the Electoral Register will be able to vote on whether to accept this candidate as the new Minister.

It's a small world!

With members of Barclay Viewforth Church coming from 'a the airts', it's not unusual to speak with someone in the same pew from a different part of the country or from a different country. It came as a lovely surprise, however, when at the last TCP meal one of the shopkeepers who came for the meal for the first time turned out to be from the Yemen where I had worked for 14 years. As we chatted though, not only was the link with the country, it was with the village of Sheikh 'Othman where I worked and where her father was born. And that was not the end – her father was the doctor I had worked with in the Church of Scotland hospital.

Dr Ahmed Affara was a legend. Born into a respected Muslim family, he was the first convert to the Christian faith. When the Scottish doctor returned to Scotland on furlough Ahmed stayed with him. He studied medicine in Edinburgh then went to Palestine for more experience. Here he met a nurse who became his wife and together they returned to the Yemen. Unfortunately, she found the conditions too primitive and opted for life in Edinburgh. Ahmed spent his life between the two countries.

By the time I arrived in the Yemen, Ahmed was nearing the end of his working life. At first he had had to win the respect of the local people who were very distrustful of his skills especially as he was a Christian. Not only did he gain their trust, but the villagers unofficially renamed the hospital 'the Affara hospital.' We were all happy with that. Nadia, with her husband, runs the electrical shop up from the church. She is the youngest of Ahmed's family. It was lovely to exchange shared memories of a very special man and a very special place.

When you are in the church and someone whom you don't know sits beside you, don't leave without chatting. You never know if there is a link between you. God moves in mysterious ways. It is a small world!

Barclay Viewforth Barbecue

Football news

The 2019 ECFA Easter Fives tournament saw a Barclay squad of seven prevail over St Columba's Free Church during the group stages; lose out narrowly to Ladywell Baptists; and rather more heavily to both White Lightning and defending Fives holders of the previous two competitions, St Mary's Metropolitan Cathedral.

Barclay Viewforth's exit before the semi-finals on a chilly night at least had the compensation of our players and supporters heading to the warm bar at Saughton Power Leagues where an epic Champions League quarter-final between Manchester City and Spurs was being screened live. White Lightning were eventually declared deserved winners and there was a fifteen-minute interruption to the televised football while a reflective message on the importance of Easter was imparted to the nine churches league teams who were present on the night.

Back in the ECFA league, it is hoped that the five-a-side result against St Columba's will be replicated in the forthcoming elevens version of the game. From a Barclay perspective, three points would be very welcome as the side sits at the foot of the table, one point and two points respectively behind the eleventh- and tenth-placed teams, Ladywell and AC Oxgangs. Oxgangs have completed their matches, so if Barclay can conjure a win in any of the three remaining league fixtures that would ensure avoiding bottom spot. A recent high-calibre league performance against league leaders Port Seton, although resulting in a single goal defeat, gives cause to believe that this can be achieved. The challenge is compounded, however, by the remaining opponents all coming from the upper echelons of the league.

Whatever the results in the remaining fixtures, coach/manager Chris Whelan will be looking for further encouraging performances as a basis for the start of the next ECFA season come August.

It remains, of course, to acknowledge the enormous contribution of departing Barclay Viewforth minister Sam Torrens to the cause of the church's football set since its modern inception in 2007. Some of that contribution was highlighted at Sam's final service on Easter Day at Barclay Viewforth and was an occasion where a number of BV players and former players were present. Thank you on behalf of the squad and management for the church's ongoing support of its football set-up – and your ongoing prayers for the direction of both our team and the ECFA would further be much appreciated.

Kitchen notes: salmon and broccoli quiche

As I sit here typing in the sunshine, I am contemplating what my meals might look like over the next week or so. I am finding it a challenge to make sure I have variety in what I am cooking both in terms of overall dishes and with the ingredients I use. I still heartily dislike cooking for one, so often cook two portions (or more) and then eat the leftovers later in the week – which makes variety more challenging, especially when combined with a 'I can't be bothered just for me' attitude.

Quiche is one of those items which falls into the love-or-hate category for many people – I love it cold, but really dislike it hot. This months recipe has the advantage of being both very tasty and easy to adapt for other fillings. It also has a helpful ratio of eggs to milk which means I can just use the dishes I already own – I don't need to go out and buy new ones. The recipe below is based on the bacon and leek flan from the dairy book of home management, but I generally make a smoked salmon and broccoli flan instead! The key ratio is 75ml milk for each egg used; and any veg should be cooked and drained before putting into the pastry. Other than that, experiment – and see what you can come up with. Either use a homemade shortcrust pastry shell that has been baked blind, or buy one! The recipe below is suitable for a 7-inch pie shell.

- Pastry pie case
- ½ head of broccoli broken into small florets and steamed enough to give a good layer on the pastry
- 75-100g smoked salmon offcuts (or chopped smoked salmon)
- 2 eggs
- 150ml milk
- Grated cheese (optional)
- Salt and pepper to season
- Put the broccoli and salmon in the pastry shell, top with grated cheese
- 2. Mix the milk, eggs and seasoning
- 3. Pour over the quiche fillings and bake at 180C for 20-25 mins until set.

If your quiche is really full, place on a baking tray so you don't need to clean the oven later!


